his summer, GFOA held its 119th annual conference in Washington, D.C. 

We also held sessions featuring leaders who represent fire services, housing authorities, transit, education, water services, and more.

GFOA has a long history of collaborating with leading local government associations. In the 1930s, GFOA was headquartered on the campus of the University of Chicago along with ICMA, the American Planning Association (APA), the Council of State Governments (CSG), APWA, the Government Welfare Association, and the National Association of Housing Officials. Today, GFOA still nurtures strong partnerships with other organizations, and we recently took steps to formally organize the Public Finance Network, an association of associations. This group is led by GFOA, and we will advocate for

infrastructure and maintenance of the tax-exempt status of municipal bonds.

As we look to the future, GFOA is continually developing stronger partnerships that facilitate information sharing, best practice development, and innovation—as well as extended member benefits and opportunities that allow finance professionals to build relationships with their peers in other areas of local government disciplines. For example, in August, we are officially launching our new membership structure, which will provide all individuals from a member organization with access to GFOA membership benefits at no additional cost.
